
The Brady Act



The Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act of 1993 (Brady Act) is the result of . . .

- The attempted assassination of former President Ronald Reagan.
- Permanent injuries sustained by Press Secretary James Brady.
- The Brady's lobby for stricter regulations in relation to the transfer of firearms.






The Brady Act was approved by Congress on November 30, 1993, as an amendment to the Gun Control Act of 1968.

- Full POC—Contact State/Territory for All Firearm Background Checks Including Permits
- Partial—POC-Contact State for Handgun & FBI for Long Gun Background Checks
- 3 Partial—POC-Contact State for Handgun Permit & FBI for Long Gun Background Checks
- Non-POC—Contact FBI for All Firearm Background Checks

Department of Homeland Security U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

On all transactions initiated for Non-U.S. Citizens, an Immigration Alien Query (IAQ) will be requested through the ICE.



Title 18, United States Code, Section 922 Federal Prohibitions

What is the NICS Index?



The NICS Index is a database created to contain information of persons prohibited from receiving firearms under Public Law 103-159, known as the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act of 1993.



Information Sharing



• Contribute disqualifying information to the FBI III and the NCIC for qualifying prohibitions.

Automate and organize data

Complete records with final dispositions
 Research and update records

• NICS Index participation

Enter disqualifying information not placed in the III and the NCIC into the NICS Index

- Disconnected dispositions

The NICS Improvement Amendments Act of 2007 (NIAA)



The NIAA provides grant programs to assist states in making records electronically available to the NICS. To qualify for funding, states are required to implement a relief from disabilities program for individuals who have been adjudicated as a mental defective under Title 18, United States Code (U.S.C.), Section 922 (g)(4).

Disposition of Firearms




- Criminal justice agencies may now access the NICS to conduct a background check for the purpose of returning firearms in their possession to an individual
- Not required by federal law
- Not accessible to criminal justice agencies for investigative purposes





Current NICS Background Check Status Screen








New NICS Background Check Status






NICS Index



- Adding NICS Index Records via the NICS E-Check
 - · Batch of records
 - Manually entering one record at a time
- How Can External Agencies Update the NICS Index via a Manual Entry?
 - External agencies will log in to the NICS E-Check and click on the NICS portal icon to create, modify, and/or cancel NICS Index records via a manual entry.
 - The system will automatically generate the NICS Record Identifier (NRI ID) and Data Source (agency source of record).
 - Agencies will enter the subject's information, including all required fields, and any additional identifying information.
 - The user will click Submit to complete the record submission.





Can You Help the NICS Section?



- Update criminal history records with complete information
- Submit warrants and protections order into the NCIC
- Submit to the NICS Index if applicable
- Conduct testing with the NICS prior to criminal history record changes
- Respond to NICS requests
 - Timely manner (Brady law provides for three business days)
 - No record if applicable
 - Agency correction
 - Provide all available documentation
